If the current forecast for this Sunday is correct, I will remind myself that canceling two Sundays in a row is not the end of the world. I will also be prepared to offer something on Zoom that morning. In the future, I may follow the lead of several of my colleagues, and move the service to Saturday afternoon on those occasions when the weather looks iffy—but I'm not ready to make that adjustment this week. If we need to meet via Zoom on Sunday, be on the lookout for a Zoom link in your email or text message.

And God saw everything that he had made, and behold, it was very good. Genesis 1:31

Wildfires in places no one would have expected. Snow every four days here in Maine's Western Foothills. Floods in places no one would have expected. Baby puffins starving to death because their parents feed them fish that are too big to swallow. Invasive blobs called sea squirts clogging ropes and traps that make oyster farming and lobstering excessively difficult. These all have one cause: global climate change. And honestly, I'm not just concerned. I'm scared. Not for me, I have somewhere between a day and twenty-five years left. But for our children – and our children's children, and for some among us, our children's children's children – this world will be different from what you and I see today. Hotter. Stormier. Snowier. Windier. Wetter. Drier. More tornadoes. Stronger hurricanes. And yes, probably famines and droughts. All caused by a world a few degrees warmer than it was 200 years ago.

Some of the climate change may be natural. But study after study has indicated that most of the change is manmade. And recent changes in our nation's capital have put many governmental programs at risk, and have obliterated others. The EPA is one of the agencies that has had enormous cuts; these cuts will affect each and every person in this world. The rescinding of clean air and clean water requirements, the permission to drill, baby drill in places that are environmentally sensitive, removal of the US from the Paris Climate Agreement, all are steps that bring the planet to the brink at a speed that is faster than ever before.

At this point, I am not going to suggest using brown paper towels instead of bleached white paper towels, nor am I going to suggest walking instead of driving, nor even carpooling or turning your thermostat down in winter or taking shorter showers. The only things we can do at this moment that may make a noticeable difference are: Pray for inspiration, guidance, and strength; Research what has changed and educate ourselves about the dangers ahead; Contact our legislators in Augusta and Washington, and tell them how concerned we are about climate change and the recent upheaval that is endangering the survival of our planet; Ask others to make their concerns known in the capitals.
