CREATION CARE TIPS

O Lord, how manifold are your works! In wisdom you have made them all; the Earth is full of your creatures. All of them look to you to give them food in due season. – Psalm 104: 25, 28

Today I want to focus on three animals that are connected to creation care work: Dogs, lobsters, and peregrine falcons.

Last August, when our daughter's family moved back to the US, she and I were heading into a diner to pick up dinner for 6 of us – as their kitchen supplies were still in storage - when suddenly she stomped her foot and swore. Surprised, I gave her a motherly and questioning look. She apologized for the vocabulary, then said she had just smashed a spotted lanternfly, and would not apologize for her actions. To date, I still have not seen a spotted lanternfly, since all that was left on the walkway was an obliterated mess, and this particular invasive species has not reached Maine yet.

An article in the Portland Press Herald last January reported that a group of concerned dog owners had participated in a pilot program, teaching their dogs to sniff out spotted lanternflies and their eggs so they can be destroyed. The article described infested areas as "Scorched earth without the fire." Why are the dogs being trained, if spotted lanternflies haven't reached Maine? Because they are expected to make their debuts next year, and "forewarned is forearmed." We don't want Maine to look like scorched Earth without the fire.

The New York Times ran an article that highlighted a fisherman named Dick Bridges, of Stonington, Maine. He is part of a team that makes chowder for church suppers. In earlier times, the chowder had several types of fish, scallops, and lobster. Now, it only has lobster, because the scallops are so tightly regulated and the groundfish have largely disappeared. Lobster is abundant but regulated and moving northward. In the 1960s Homarus americanus was caught off the coasts of Maryland, Delaware, and New Jersey. In 1990, the species all but disappeared from Connecticut waters. Luckily for us, it's thriving off the Maine coast, but the migration due to warming waters is not slowing, and will not wait for global warming to cease. The movement of lobster populations to higher latitudes is a harbinger, or very visible indicator, of climate change.

And above us, in the blue skies, the Peregrine falcon soars and swoops, searching for some hapless critter that will be its next meal. The Lewiston Sun Journal reported in late May that the Peregrine falcon population in Maine is not affected by avian fluYET. The disease that raised the prices of eggs and emptied supermarket dairy department's refrigerators earlier this year hasn't made its way to our region. We hope it doesn't. We hope researchers will find a way to protect the egg industry and wild birds. We hope funding for this type of research, research that will lead to a return of groundfish off Stonington, and research that will control the spotted lanternfly will not be removed from the federal budget.
