CREATION CARE TIPS

LASAGNA GARDENING

Lasagna gardening is a funny term that's used to describe the layering of materials in the garden. In this case one of the materials is cardboard. Better Homes and Gardens magazine published an article that offered nine environmentally friendly things to do with cardboard. (They disappointed me when they left out sliding down a snowy hill on a refrigerator box - no plastic saucer or inner tube required.)

Here's a brief rundown: Transform a section of lawn by layering food scraps, mulch, compost, soil, and cardboard where you want a garden. The cardboard will help kill off the weeds and grass under it, and the other layers will enrich the soil. This same technique can be used in raised beds – the kind that sit on the ground, rather than the kind that stand waist high on sturdy legs. You can eliminate weeds by laying cardboard on them and waiting. (If your weedy area is on a windy hilltop, like mine is, you'll need to weigh it down with rocks or pieces of windfall branches.) A three to one ratio of cardboard to food scraps and other green materials makes a good blend for your compost bin. Just be sure to reduce the size of the cardboard pieces so they decompose quickly. Toilet paper rolls can be used to start seedlings. To begin, just fold one end in by pushing the edge with one thumb, and continue around the rim, creating a slightly leaky "plant pot" and fill it with dirt. This 'plant pot' can be used to protect seedlings from cutworms (alias grubs) when

transplanting. Paper towel tubes (also foil, parchment paper, wax paper, plastic wrap, and gift wrap tubes) can be split lengthwise and slipped around tender stalks, to keep the seedlings upright until they strengthen. No staking and tying necessary.

If your green thumb itches long before the last frost date, and you plant too early, you can cover tender seedlings with cardboard when the forecast warns of a frosty night ahead. Once all danger of frost has passed, save some of the cardboard to make slug traps. If you notice slug damage, lay the cardboard on the ground, and wait. Check every day or so and collect the slugs that congregate under it. Then do them in! (An aluminum pie plate of salty beer will also attract them and kill them, but since there's no cardboard involved, the magazine skipped this tidbit of information.)

Perhaps your new and improved garden won't win awards, but you'll be keeping cardboard out of the waste stream. Why is this important, if cardboard is recyclable? Because cardboard can only be recycled a few times before it is too processed; then it becomes waste.
