#### **CREATION CARE TIPS**

Power at our fingertips... most of the time.

Every Tuesday at about 2:06 PM, our generator chugs on, starting up for its weekly twelve minute test and battery charge. So two days ago, when the electricity went out due to a blown transformer, we didn't know

it. We knew something was wrong when we couldn't use the internet. Then our generator didn't shut down at the usual time, and Bruce received two texts, one from our power company and one from our cable company. Finally we knew it wasn't just us, and we began to relax.

We decided (wrongly) that the outage must be fairly local, so we left home on our planned afternoon trip to pay taxes and buy a few groceries. No stores on Main Street had lights. We heard the generators running at the bank. The town office was open, but not doing business without computer access. But surely the grocery store would still be up and running... Well, sorta kinda. In the specialty cheese and produce sections, gray window shades were pulled down in front of the multi-level refrigerated open shelves. The deli section had heavy plastic sheeting over any open shelving that was refrigerated. The lobsters weren't in their tank. The meat department looked much the same as the produce and cheese sections. Yellow caution tape sealed off the refrigerated bins that displayed the meats on sale. The frozen foods aisles were closed to shoppers, blocked by shopping carts.

As we picked up the last of the shelf-stable items on our list, the announcement was made that all sections of the store would now be reopened. I headed over to the meat section to select the pork chops we'll be cooking tonight. A man was pulling up the gray shades. As he finished and headed for the heavy plastic sheeting over the processed meats, I asked him if the shades were pulled down every night, thinking that it would be a great way to reduce energy costs. And yes, the store does close the cold sections every night! It reduces the wear and tear on their cooling units, saves them money, and allows them to boast about their green initiatives.

I never noticed the shades before. Next time I'm in another grocery store, I'll sneak a peek at the tops of the refrigerated shelving. Seeing the rolled-up curtains will make me happy.
